From the Pastor

We continue our study of the shortened form of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* called the *Compendium*. We will finish up the last four questions of the section on the Seven Sacraments of the Church. Here are this week's questions with the catechism's answer and my commentary.

What forms of popular piety accompany the sacramental life of the Church? The religious sense of the Christian people has always found expression in the various forms of piety which accompany the sacramental life of the Church such as the veneration of relics, visits to sanctuaries, pilgrimages, processions, the stations of the cross and the rosary. The Church sheds the light of faith upon and fosters authentic forms of popular piety.

Commentary: The Church's communal life of prayer is not exhausted by the celebration of the Sacraments, although the celebration of the Sacraments, most especially the Eucharist, is at the core of the Church's worship and life. Other public expressions of prayer and worship have always been a part of the Church's devotional life: venerating the remains of saints, visiting churches and other holy places, making pilgrimages, participating in Eucharistic processions, praying the stations of the cross in church or outdoors, and praying the rosary with others or alone. There are multitudes of devotional practices that have risen in the life of the Church. They help to root the graces received in the Sacraments of the Church more deeply in the hearts of believers.

What is the relationship between the sacraments and the death of a Christian? The Christian who dies in Christ reaches at the end of his earthly existence the fulfillment of that new life which was begun in Baptism, strengthened in Confirmation, and nourished in the Eucharist, the foretaste of the heavenly banquet. The meaning of the death of a Christian becomes clear in the light of the death and Resurrection of Christ our only hope. The Christian who dies in Christ Jesus goes "away from the body and at home with the Lord" (2 Corinthians 5:8).

Commentary: We can fruitfully compare our earthly life to the journey of ancient Israel to the Promised Land. Our baptism, when Christ freed us from the power of sin and death, is like Israel's exodus from servitude in Egypt. The Eucharist is like the manna that sustained Israel along its desert journey for forty years. Our death, when Jesus leads us over the waters of death to enter his Father's house, is like Joshua leading the children of Israel through the waters of the Jordan River to enter the Promised Land. Death is the final, culminating passage to eternal life for those who have accompanied the Lord faithfully on their earthly journey.

What do funeral rites express? Although celebrated in different rites in keeping with the situations and traditions of various regions, funerals express the paschal character of Christian death in hope of the resurrection. They also manifest the meaning of communion with the departed particularly through prayer for the purification of their souls.

Commentary: The paschal character of a Christian's life and death is succinctly expressed by St. Paul: "If we have died with Christ, we shall also live with Christ" (Romans 6: 8). We die and rise with Christ through the grace of our Baptism. Baptismal grace enables the Christian to continually die and rise with Christ throughout their earthly life. We die with Christ as we put to death all evil thoughts and desires within us; we rise with Christ as we build up within ourselves all the virtues and gifts that enable us to share fully in the life of God. At the moment of death, we fully enter into the death of Christ so that on the last day, after a period of final cleansing from sin called purgatory, we may fully enter into his Resurrection. All of this is beautifully expressed in the Church's funeral rites where she celebrates the Paschal Mystery and prays for her dead.

What are the main moments in funerals? Usually, funeral rites consist of four principal parts: welcoming the body of the deceased by the community in words of comfort and hope, the liturgy of the Word, the Eucharistic Sacrifice, and the farewell in which the soul of the departed is entrusted to God, the Source of eternal life, while the body is buried in the hope of the resurrection.

Commentary: The funeral rites draw upon the symbols used in the celebration of Baptism: the Paschal candle, the symbol of Christ's resurrection; the white drape over the casket, a remembrance of the baptismal garment; the sprinkling of the body with holy water, a remembrance of baptism itself. A Christian's bodily death is their final conformance to the death of Christ in expectation of the fulfillment of Christ's baptismal promises of future resurrection for all the faithful. The Holy Sacrifice of the Mass is celebrated for the repose of the soul of the deceased to assist them in their final purification, and the body of the deceased is reverently buried in holy ground in expectation of the resurrection on the Last Day.

CONFIRMATION CORNER

Our confirmation candidates met for their first class on Saturday, September 28th. Time seemed to fly by as we got to know each other better and together, we read and reflected on Scripture passages that described who the Spirit is, what the role of the Spirit is in the Church and the role of the Spirit in each of our lives. We watched a short video on the importance of the choices we make and then had a brief introduction to the seven themes of Catholic Social Teaching that will be explored at each of the remaining seven class periods.
