From the Pastor

As we continue with the shortened form of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* called the *Compendium*, we begin the section entitled *The Paschal Mystery in the Age of the Church*. Here are this week's three questions with the catechism's answer and my commentary.

How is the liturgy celebrated? The celebration of the liturgy is interwoven with signs and symbols whose meaning is rooted in creation and in human culture. It is determined by the events of the Old Testament and is fully revealed in the Person and work of Christ.

Commentary: Liturgy is not simply done, it is "celebrated." Liturgy is a celebration of God's mighty deeds, the wonders and marvels he has done for man throughout history. The Church continually thanks and praises God for two fundamental gifts: the gift of Creation, the universe he has brought into being and which he sustains at every moment; and the gift of Redemption from sin, prepared for in the Old Testament through the prophets and fulfilled through the Incarnation, death and Resurrection of God's Son, Jesus Christ. The Church, under the headship of Christ and in the power of the Spirit, glorifies the Father day and night, year after year, century after century, "for in goodness you (the Father) created man and, when he was justly condemned, in mercy you redeemed him, through Christ our Lord" (Common Preface II from the Roman Missal).

From where do the sacramental signs come? Some come from created things (light, water, fire, bread, wine, oil); others come from social life (washing, anointing, breaking of bread). Still others come from the history of salvation in the Old Covenant (the Passover rites, the sacrifices, the laying on of hands, the consecrations). These signs, some of which are normative and unchangeable, were taken up by Christ and are made the bearers of his saving and sanctifying action.

Commentary: God, who is infinitely transcendent and utterly beyond the whole of creation, is also infinitely near to his creation and intimately involved in the lives of men. He has drawn near to us especially in the Incarnation of his Son, Jesus Christ, so that the humanity of Christ may become the sign and instrument of God's saving power: to rescue the human race from captivity to sin and restore harmony to a fallen universe. Christ has been pleased to extend the work of salvation to every age through the instrumentality of his Church, whom he saves and nourishes by means of the Sacraments. Christ has appointed the Church to use certain created things—*water* in Baptism, *oil* in Confirmation, the Anointing of the Sick and Holy Orders, *bread and wine* in the Eucharist—to be bearers of his saving grace. He has appointed the Church to engage in certain elemental actions—*washing* in Baptism, *anointing* in Confirmation, the Anointing of the Sick and Holy Orders, *eating and drinking* in the Eucharist—and certain sacred rituals—*the exchange of vows* in Matrimony, *the words of absolution* in Reconciliation, *the memorial sacrifice* of the Eucharist, *the laying on of hands* in Confirmation and Holy Orders—to bestow his saving grace to those who participate in them.

What is the link between the actions and the words in the celebration of the sacraments? Actions and words are very closely linked in the celebration of the sacraments. Indeed, even if the symbolic actions are already in themselves a language, it is necessary that the words of the rite accompany and give life to these actions. The liturgical words and actions are inseparable both insofar as they are meaningful signs and insofar as they bring about what they signify.

Commentary: Christ is God's Word through whom all things were made and who accomplishes all that the Father wills for the sake of his creatures. In his earthly ministry, the Word made flesh, Jesus Christ, accomplished our salvation through words and actions. He now extends the grace of the redemption he won for us through the words and actions of the Sacraments. For, it is Christ who speaks through the words of the Sacraments, it is Christ who works through the actions of the Sacraments. The words clarify the actions. The actions accomplish the words.
